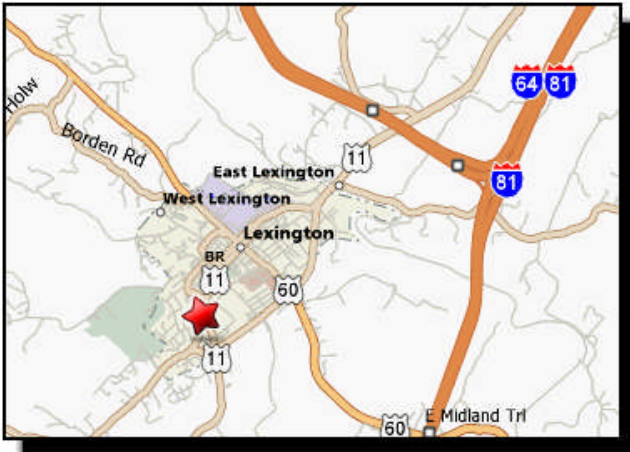
**Lexington Fire Department

- Travel north on Interstate 81 to Exit No. 188B.
- Travel west on US 60 (E. Midland Trl.)
- Turn left on US 11 Bypass.
- Turn right on US 11 Business (S. Main St.).
- The fire department is on the right.

Torso Trauma

ALS CAT 1 (Area 78—Rapid Trauma Assessment 0.5 CEUs; Area 81—Chest Injury 1.0 CEUs; Area 82—Abdominal Injury 0.5 CEUs) BLS CAT 1 (Area 04—Trauma Emergencies 2.0 CEUs)
